Course Content

Pacific Island Countries or Oceania also known as Southwest Pacific region is geographically

divided into Melanesia, Micronesia and Polynesia. It is one of the most vibrant regions, since all

the islands in the region are micro or small islands with a population of less than 1 million;

except for Papua New Guinea. Australia and New Zealand being geographically a part of

Oceania have been the major regional players in enhancing security, political and economic aid

to almost all the islands. The impact of World War II, Cold War and the Post-Cold War on the islands has shaped the politics of the region quite interestingly; especially due to its presumed remoteness and geographic isolation. The Pacific Islands have gained unique strategic importance in the present world where the extra-regional players like China, Japan, UK, US and France and India are considering the Pacific region to be a part of the Indo-Pacific. Regional Cooperation and regionalization of these islands has been the game changer in making the small islands to gain international recognition due to its diplomacy at UN with regard to Climate Change in the present times and South Pacific Nuclear Weapon Free Zone Treaty (SPNWF) earlier.

- Pacific Islands and Geopolitical framework- the ethno-geographic understanding of Melanesia, Micronesia and Polynesia, role of Micro-states in politics, diplomacy and security

- 6. **Regionalism in the Pacific-** Role of Pacific Island Forum, Pacific Commission, Pacific Island Development Forum, South Pacific regional Environmental Programme. multiculturalism are explored.
- 7. **Ethno nationalism-** Rise of rebellion, Self- Determination in Bougainville, Solomon Islands, Fiji and New Caledonia.
- 8. **Regional Issues-** The biggest challenge of Climate Change and environmental diplomacy of small states, Nuclear issues with special focus on the South Pacific Nuclear Free Zone (SPNFZ) Treaty

9. **Pacific in the Indo-Pacific-** Role of Japan, US, UK, France, China and India in the region
